Materials:

Be sure to cover the table and floor with a newspaper, butcher paper, shower curtain...just in case!

- Pig printable
- Gallon-sized sealable plastic bag
- Shaving cream
- Brown washable tempera paint

Directions:

- 1. Print the pig.
- 2. Put the pig in the plastic bag.
- 3. Squirt some of the brown tempera paint and shaving cream into the bag.
- 4. Seal the bag.
- 5. Pat, Pat Pat! Flat hands on the bag.
- 6. Take the pig out of the bag and let it dry on a metal pan.
- 7. Glue your finished pig to construction paper.
- 8. Proudly display your pig on your refrigerator for all to see.

Muddy Pig Sensory Art

This art activity combines sensory with fine motor to create a delightful muddy pig. The beauty of it is that the plastic bag puts an excellent barrier between hands and gooey stuff, and it minimizes strange smells while still allowing for lots of fun. You could eliminate the plastic bag if your child isn't overly sensitive to new sensations.

Experiment with big pats and little pats, fast pats and slow pats. Talk about the pig's eyes and ears. Point out their curly tail. Make a family of pigs and talk about who's the baby, who is the mama pig.
