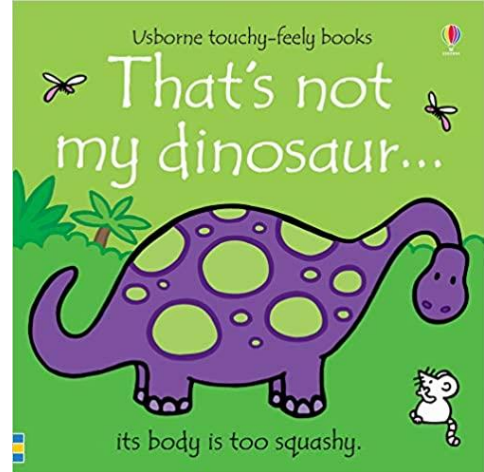

Descriptive Vocabulary words: Bumpy Squishy Fuzzy Slippery Rough Soft

Activities to go along with the book:

1. Make a sensory bin with bumpy, squishy, fuzzy, slippery, rough, and soft items. As you are playing, hold an item up and say, "Oh Bumpy, Bumpy, Bumpy," or whatever texture your item is.
2. Put items that are bumpy, squishy, fuzzy, slippery, rough, and soft in a container with a lid, cut a hole in the lid, and have your child reach in and take out an object. Use vocabulary words for the item: example: "Oh Squishy, squishy, squishy."
3. After you've played a few times, ask a question, "Is this squishy or bumpy?" See if they can answer the question correctly. If they don't answer, it's okay. Again, answer the question for them, "Oh, it's bumpy, bumpy, bumpy."

Tips for reading to toddlers

It is great to adapt the story to your child's attention span. You can skip pages and not read all the words. Try singing the words or acting out the actions on each page. Think about ways to interact with the book beyond the pages. Be animated and silly.
